

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Google Fiber Comes to Raytown

Raytown continues to propel itself toward the future as a first-tier suburb.

One of Raytown's biggest recent announcements was on May 21, when the **Raytown Board of Aldermen unanimously voted to bring Google Fiber to Raytown.**

Google recognized the vision that our city has for keeping our citizens informed. Because of the hard work of the city staff and Google representatives we will be able to move our city into the future.

Raytown was the second city in Missouri to pen an agreement.

“This is a thrilling opportunity for our community,” said Mayor David Bower. This announcement has already brought notoriety to Raytown from around the country. We’ve had calls from all over the United States asking about our city and this service.

Some may not know what Google Fiber is. Google Fiber provides an Internet connection speed of one gigabit per second for both download and upload. This is roughly 100 times faster access than what most Americans have. **Here’s a quick analogy to put Fiber’s speed into perspective:** Two cars leave from Kansas City — one traveling at Fiber speeds and the other at normal broadband speeds. The Fiber car reaches New York before the other car has hit the outskirts of the Kansas City Metro area.

Public Works Kicks Off Coupon Program - Wednesday, May 15, 2013

The public works department will begin selling \$5 coupons (\$25 value) for unwanted items around the house, to be used at two disposal companies in the Raytown area: Material Recovery Transport (MRT) and Flynn’s. The coupons have a 60 day expiration date. Two coupons over a two-year period will be available for addresses located in Raytown. Proof of identification, i.e. a driver’s license and a recent (within the last two months) utility bill will be needed to obtain the coupon. The vendor sets the fees for their services. Only cash and checks are accepted.

3. Do either of them take hazardous materials?

No.

4. When should I get the coupon?

The coupons are good for 60 days, so purchase them accordingly.

5. If I don’t use it can I have a refund?

No. Once purchased they are non-refundable.

6. Can I purchase with a credit card?

No. Cash or check only.

7. Can I purchase it through the mail?

Yes. But you must provide a photo id and a copy of a recent (within the last 2 months) utility bill along with the \$5 fee.


How Your Tax Dollars are Spent

The Finance Department is the steward of both the property tax and sales tax revenues collected by the City. These revenues are used to fund City services and run day to day operations of the City.

Sales Tax

AS OF NOVEMBER 1, 2012

The **2013 City Sales Tax rate is 8.225 percent** of gross sales. Sales tax revenues are used to support several taxing entities including the City, State and County, as well as several special interests.



Residential Property Tax

AS OF NOVEMBER 1, 2012

The **2012 Property Tax rate is \$9.1932** of every \$100 of assessed property value. The City's portion of the \$9.1932 is **\$0.5539**. Each Levy is established in September before the tax bills are issued. Property taxes on a \$150,000 home would be \$2,618.69 of which \$157.86 goes to the City.

Neighborhood Stabilization

Rehabbing & Building New Homes In Raytown

We often hear about the new and exciting commercial development that is currently happening in our downtown area and the Highway 350 Corridor. But, all of the things that the city is doing in residential areas do not get the same attention. One of the programs that we have in place that is making a difference in the home values of our citizens' neighborhoods is called the **Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP)**.

The NSP provides assistance to state and local governments to acquire and redevelop properties that might otherwise become sources of abandonment and blight. Raytown works with the non-profit **Builders Development Corporation (BDC)** who manages the program for the metro area. There are no local funds required by the City to participate in the program.

In Raytown, the program began with two vacant, dilapidated homes that had been identified as dilapidated by the city. The homes were accepted in the program. They were torn down. Then, new energy-efficient homes were built by local builders. Now, where there was once blight, there is now hope – a source of pride for our city which has resulted in improved property values for these properties as well as surrounding properties in the neighborhood.

John Benson, Director of Development and Public Affairs, worked with the BDC to acquire another property on Sterling. This property was brought to our attention by a neighbor. They talked to Mr. Benson to see if anything could be done with a house that had been abandoned. Mr. Benson took the program to the BDC to see if it qualified. It did. The home was razed and a new home built in its place. The home is currently under contract.

The city has identified two more properties that have been purchased by the BDC. Because of the size of the lots BDC will be able to build three new energy-efficient homes. They continue to work with the city for other opportunities to build homes that will help remove blighted properties, strengthen property values and ensure livability for decades.

Not only are the homes priced very affordable, the BDC also offers some assistance on the down-payment.

These properties are available for 120% area median income level.

So what does that mean? That means that a one-person household can make up to \$59,200 and still qualify. So these homes are available to teachers, nurses, and firefighters. It goes up if there are more people in the home. **Down-payment assistance may be as much as \$40,000** but there are some financial qualifications to receive the assistance and the homeowner must stay in the home for five years.

We look forward to working with the BDC in the future.

Pet Summer Safety Tips

ANIMAL CONTROL — Hot weather can make us all uncomfortable, and it poses special risks for your dog. Keep the following safety concerns in mind as the temperature rises, and follow our tips to keep your dog cool.



Heat Hazards

- If your dog is outside on a hot day, make sure he has a shady spot to rest in. Doghouses are not good shelter during the summer as they can trap heat. You may want to fill a child's wading pool with fresh water for your dog to cool off in.
- Always provide plenty of cool, fresh water.
- Avoid strenuous exercise on extremely hot days. Take walks in the early mornings or evenings, when the sun's heat is less intense.
- Try to avoid prolonged exposure to hot asphalt or sand, which can burn your dog's paws.

THINGS TO KNOW Keep Your Pets Safe this Summer

Excessive Noise

With windows open in spring and summer, pet owners need to be aware of **excessive noise**. Pet owners should keep in mind that their pets not disturb a neighborhood by making excessive noise. This includes any noise that is loud and continuous or untimely to disturb the peace and quiet of a neighbor within 100 yards.

Travel

By Air

- Many airlines will not ship animals during summer months due to dangers caused by hot weather. Some will only allow dogs to fly in the early morning or in the evening. Check with your airlines for specific rules.
- If you do ship a dog, put icepacks or an ice blanket in the dog's crate. (Two-liter soft drink bottles filled with water and frozen work well.) Provide a container of fresh water, as well as a container of frozen water that will thaw over the course of the trip.

By Car

- Keep your dog cool in the car by putting icepacks in his crate. Make sure the crate is well ventilated.
- Put a sunshade on your car windows.
- Bring along fresh water and a bowl, and a tarp or tent so you can set up a shady spot when you stop. Keep a spray bottle filled with water to spritz on your dog to cool him down.

By RV

- A dog's safety should not depend on the air conditioning and generator systems in an RV or motor home. These devices can malfunction, with tragic results.
- If you leave your dog in an RV with the generator running, check it often or have a neighbor monitor it. Some manufacturers have devices that will notify you if the generator should malfunction.
- Never leave an RV or motor home completely shut up, even if the generator and AC are running. Crack a window or door or run the exhaust fan.

Never, ever leave a dog unattended in a vehicle in the summer months. Heatstroke and death can occur within minutes in warm temperatures.

Heatstroke

Heatstroke can be the serious and often fatal result of a dog's prolonged exposure to excessive heat. Below are the signs of heatstroke and the actions to take.

Early Stages

- Heavy panting.
- Rapid breathing.
- Excessive drooling.
- Bright red gums and tongue.
- Standing 4-square, posting or spreading out in an attempt to maintain balance.

Advanced Stages

- White or blue gums.
- Lethargy, unwillingness to move.
- Uncontrollable urination or defecation.
- Labored, noisy breathing.
- Shock.

If your dog begins to exhibit signs of heatstroke, you should immediately try to cool the dog down:

- Apply rubbing alcohol to the dog's paw pads.
- Apply ice packs to the groin area.
- Hose down with water.
- Have the dog to lick ice chips or drink a small amount of water.
- Offer Pedialyte to restore electrolytes.

Check your dog's temperature regularly. Once the dog's temperature has stabilized between 100 to 102 degrees, you can stop the cool-down process. If you begin to see signs of advanced heatstroke, take the dog to the veterinarian immediately.

Licensing

The City of Raytown requires **all cats, dogs, ferrets and pot-bellied pigs** over 90 days old to have an annual city license. This license is separate from the rabies tag issued by your veterinarian. The annual license period now runs concurrent with your annual rabies vaccination. If your veterinarian provides a multi-year rabies vaccination, a license can be purchased for the same number of years. To get a license, bring an application and proof of the pet's rabies vaccination to Raytown City Hall with the appropriate fee. The city license tag must be displayed on the collar of the pet when the animal is outside. You can obtain an application on our website or at city hall.

Summer Safety Tips

As summer approaches, the Development and Public Affairs Department is urging homeowners to take the time to check outdoor areas for potential safety hazards.



Proper inspections now can help to keep you family and friends safe in the future.

All of these codes are in place for a reason. They are added safety measures to protect you and your guests from outdoor accidents.

Porches, Decks and Balconies

Porches can be at risk of collapsing if they are not properly constructed or if they are old. The City of Raytown has building codes that homeowners must follow when building or repairing porches. A common safety hazard occurs when porches are nailed to buildings rather than being attached with the proper anchors or bolts.

Other safety hazards to look for are:

- Split or rotting wood
- Wobbly handrails or guardrails
- Loose, missing or rusting anchors, nails or screws
- Missing, damaged or loose support beams and planking
- Poor end support of the porch deck, joists or girders
- Excessive movement of the porch when walked on
- Swaying or unstable porches

Building or repairing to Raytown codes, which requires a building permit and an inspection, helps ensure the porch is safe.

Grills

Grilling on or near combustible areas can be a fire hazard. In condos and apartment buildings, it can put your neighbors in danger as well.

Follow these safety grilling tips:

- Place the grill away from siding, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup
- Use only proper starter fluid and store the can away from heat sources
- Check propane cylinder hoses for leaks before use
- Do not move hot grills
- Dispose of charcoal properly, keeping ash containers outside and away from combustible construction

The Fire Code prohibits the use of charcoal and gas grills and other open burning devices on combustible porches or within 10 feet of combustible construction. There are exceptions for one- and two-family homes and where buildings and porches are protected by an automatic sprinkler system.

Backyard & Pool Safety

As families move outdoors to enjoy nice weather in spring and summer, special precautions should be taken to ensure outdoor areas are safe from potential hazards. Swimming pools, barbecue grills, gardening tools and fertilizers, and lawn toys all pose risks to children and adults alike.

- Practice constant, adult supervision around any body of water, including pools and spas. Nationally, drowning is a leading cause of death to children under five.
- If you're considering a swimming pool purchase, contact your local Building Department first to determine exactly what permits are needed and what requirements you must follow.
- In-ground and above-ground pools, including inflatable pools holding more than 24 inches of water, must be surrounded by a fence or other barrier at least four feet high. Any gates in the fence must be self-closing and self-latching.
- Reserve a spot on a wall or fence near the pool for lifesaving devices, including a portable or mobile telephone.
- Steps and ladders for above-ground pools should be secured or removed when the pool is not in use.
- Use a cover for the pool when it is not in use.
- Consider installing a pool alarm that can alert if someone enters the pool.
- Make sure drain covers are properly fitted and paired or have vacuum suction releases to prevent being trapped under water.
- Spa water temperatures should be set to 104 degrees Fahrenheit or lower to avoid elevated body temperature, which could lead to drowsiness, unconsciousness, heat stroke, or death.
- Designate the grilling area as a "No Play Zone" and keep kids and pets well away until grill equipment is completely cool.
- Check propane cylinder hoses for leaks before use.
- Do not move hot grills.
- Never add charcoal starter fluid when coals or kindling have already been ignited, and never use any flammable or combustible liquid other than charcoal starter fluid to get the fire going.
- Don't leave toys, tools and equipment in the yard.
- Keep steps, sidewalks and patios in good repair.

Preparing for Severe Weather

If severe weather develops, do you know what to do?

Did you know that lightning can hit as much as 10 miles away from any rainfall? You can count the seconds between thunder and lightning to determine how far away a storm center is, but that distance won't stop lightning from reaching you.

Damage from severe thunderstorm winds is more common than damage from tornados. Add hail to that, and imagine being outside while balls of ice are whipping at you at 70+ mph. Now add additional debris that is picked up by those winds, and it's just common sense to take shelter.

Summer DIY Projects – Do I Need a Permit from the City?

Always check with our building department (737-6011) before beginning home-improvement projects. Requirements vary. As a result of getting a permit, Raytown's building official will check the work. Inspections provide a measure of safety to protect your life and property. Projects that require permits: re-roofing, installing a pool, spa or hot tub, building an addition, including seasonal rooms, installing appliances and replacements such as furnaces, boilers, water heaters, fireplaces and air conditioners, replacing water or plumbing drain lines.

So remember to:


1. Wear a helmet.
2. Wearing bright clothes and putting reflectors on your bike
3. You'll also want to make sure that nothing will get caught in your bike chain, such as loose pant legs, backpack straps, or shoelaces.
4. Wear the right shoes — sneakers — when you bike. Sandals, flip-flops, shoes with heels, and cleats won't help you grip the pedals. And never go riding barefoot!
5. Avoid wearing headphones because the music can distract you from noises around you, such as a car blowing its horn so you can get out of the way.

Free Crime Mapping

The Raytown Police Department has partnered with Bair Software to provide free crime mapping to the community through RAIDS Online:

www.raidsonline.com

This application allows citizens to **see crime in their neighborhood** through an easily understood and easy to use interface available to anyone with Internet access. A free iOS app is also available and an Android version is coming soon.

The crime data is automatically uploaded to the map every day. To protect victim's privacy, addresses are only given to the nearest hundred block instead of the exact house number; certain crime types, like sexual assaults, are randomly offset by several hundred yards to further

protect privacy. Users can sort by date or by crime type and can even overlay a density map over the data points. Citizens can also sign up for neighborhood crime activity reports to be automatically notified of activity nearby.
