Volunteering can be one of the most important and useful ways to really get to know your community. Participating can help you solve a problem or concern, meet people and make friends, use your talents and help you have a sense of belonging.

This Newsletter will give you more ideas to bring pride to our city and get involved! The possibilities are endless. The reward is priceless.

Take Pride! Get Involved!

What do you do to make our little part of the world better?

Webster defines pride as a pleasure or satisfaction taken in an achievement, possession, or association. Every resident in Raytown is a valuable resource to building a city that makes us proud. How often do we brag about the good things in our city? Do we get in a rut of just complaining or noticing what's not going well? There are many things to be proud of in Raytown. And there are many ways for you to help us make our little part of the world even better. This newsletter will highlight some ways to get involved in your city!

Serving on a board or commission offers Raytown residents an extraordinary opportunity to participate in the City's governmental affairs. The most important qualifications for serving are an interest and willingness to serve. The application for these committees and commissions can be found at www.raytown.mo.us or by calling the City Clerk at 816.737.6003.

- 1. Board of Zoning Adjustment** meets on the second Thursday of each month for approximately one hour. This committee deals with appeals of citizens on property matters.
- 2. Building Code Board of Appeals** meet as needed to hear and decide appeals concerning building codes.
- 3. Community Health Advisory Committee** meets as needed.
- 4. Economic Development Advisory Committee** meets as needed to enhance the economic viability of the community.
- 5. Elected Officials Compensation Committee** meets every two years to determine what pay levels are appropriate for Raytown's elected officials.
- 6. Industrial Development Authority** meets annually to review Industrial Development Bond Applications and issue Revenue Bonds.



- 7. Planning and Zoning Commission** meets once a month to act on various applications relating to allowable use on land and preparing a comprehensive plan.
- 8. Policeman's Retirement Fund** meets quarterly to review the Police Pension Plan.
- 9. Property Maintenance Board** meets as needed to provide an appeal process for property maintenance ordinances.
- 10. Raytown Community Foundation** meets as needed to ensure money is donated through the Foundation according to guidelines.
- 11. Raytown Park Board** meets monthly and is the governing body tasked with operating and managing the city park and recreation system.
- 12. Raytown Tree Board** meets monthly and is the advisory body that manages the city's trees and arboriculture system.
- 13. Sales Tax Review Committee** meets 4-6 times per year to review spending related to the Public Safety, Transportation and Capital Sales taxes.
- 14. Tax Increment Financing Commission** meets as needed to review all Tax Increment Finance applications that are filed and make recommendations to the Board of Aldermen.

Raytown Summer Lunch Program

This program has now grown to include many of the congregations and organizations of our community helping to feed children who may go without a meal. This year more than 800 children were fed each week during the summer.

Keep Up On The Charter

On April 1, 2014, the citizens of Raytown voted to elect a commission to write a charter for the city. They also voted on 13 residents to sit on the commission. The commissioners have been working to put together a charter that the voters will approve. This document could affect every resident of Raytown. It's important to keep abreast of what the commission is writing. The deadline for residents to vote on a charter is the first election in April, 2015. City Budget

The city's fiscal year runs from November 1 to October 31 annually. The 2014-15 Budget is currently being written and will go to the Board of Aldermen for approval in October. When completed it will be available for residents to view on the city's Website. Our finances are independently audited yearly by an outside firm.



Pet Licensing

The City of Raytown requires your pet to be licensed. Why? To ensure pets get back to their owners when they are lost and to ensure that pets are being properly vaccinated. Pet licenses are required annually on the same month as your pet receives its rabies vaccination. Pet licenses can be obtained at City Hall.

We are also encouraging our residents to visit Raytown Animal Hospital to view the pets we have for adoption. There are so many amazing dogs and cats that need good homes. If you're wanting a pet, consider adoption.



Take Pride! Get Involved!

A part of living in a community is being a good neighbor and encouraging others to do the same.

The City encourages residents and businesses to make Raytown better by keeping your property in good shape. Our codes department's job is to identify problems in the community and to help our citizens solve those problems.

The following are good goals to help take pride in your community:

- Keep houses painted and in good repair. This maintains property values and encourages other neighbors to do the same.
- Make sure lawns are mowed regularly.
- Instead of keeping old cars in a yard, donate them to charity.
- Bring in trash containers right away after pick up.
- Keep the noise from parties and social events down so it doesn't bother anyone.
- Dog owners should control barking and pick up after their dog.
- Get to know your neighbors, offer to keep an eye on their houses and yards and ask them to do the same for you.
- Treat neighbors respectfully. If there is an issue, be polite and suggest ways to solve the problem. Show that you are willing to listen to their concerns and they will be willing to cooperate.

Residential Coupon

Raytown offers our residents a clean-up coupon that can be purchased for \$5.00 anytime during the year. Residents can obtain two coupons per residential property in a two-year period. All coupons have a 60-day expiration period. Proof of residency in the form of a utility bill and picture id is required to receive a coupon. The \$5 coupon has a \$25 value; the city does not set the fees that the private businesses charge. The coupon may not cover the entire fee to dispose of items; the resident is responsible for all fees that exceed the value of the coupon or coupons. No refunds are offered on the unused coupon value.

On July 15, the Board of Aldermen voted to allow the manufacturing of beer in our community opening the door to **local entrepreneurs of craft beer**. Our first brewery will be started by Master Brewer Michael Crane of Crane Brewing. Recently, we interview Michael about his endeavors.

Where will your brewery be located?

For the past 20 years I have owned another business in Raytown at 6515 Railroad. Our renter is leaving so we will be building the brewery in the half of the building that we had rented out.

How did you decide to open a brewery?

During the holiday season in 2010 my wife and I saw a Mr. Beer kit on sale at Target. We purchased it thinking it would be a fun project to do with our college-age children. I found it very fascinating and started reading everything I could get my hands on. After about 2 years of homebrewing I joined the homebrew club Kansas City Bier Meisters. That is where I started to learn about styles of beer and started entering competitions. Then I started winning competitions. Then I started winning almost every competition all over the country. In two years of entering competitions I won about 80 medals and 2 Best In Show (see insert for just a few of his medals).

The crazy thing is, although I am passionate about brewing beer I have never been much of a beer drinker. But I really do drink beer, just not a lot. Anyway, last December there were a series of events that led me toward making the decision to open a brewery.

- 1. For the past** 20 years I have owned Funblock Tables but for the past few years it has not been profitable. Then in December I found out that a large job we have been working on was being outsourced to China.
- 2. A friend was** over on New Year's day who is a Master Beer Judge and he was drinking one of my Beet Beers. He made the comment, "if someone was drinking this beer in a bar, everyone would order one because it was so unique and beautiful."
- 3. I met an** attorney who had been a homebrewer and was interested in opening a brewery someday.
- 4. I had been** talking to another young man who had been planning on starting a brewery for many months. He already

had a professional brewer and a friend who was a chemical engineer.

5. I decided to contact my CPA about the brewery plans and he was very interested in being a partner.

6. Another friend who I had been brewing with was interested in being a partner and going to brewing school.

All the pieces were falling into place and we started having weekly meetings in February, formed an LLC and started going to beer festivals. Then we joined the American Brewers Association as a Brewery in Planning.

Why did you pick Raytown?

I owned the building in Raytown and when I started talking to the city about my plans they were very excited and have gone out of their way to help us.

What are your dreams for the brewery?

I have been in Raytown for over 20 years and would love to be somehow instrumental in making Raytown a destination location. I think if we can bring people to our tap room that otherwise have not have come here it could provide a great incentive for other business to come to town. Raytown has always been supportive of local business and it would be great to somehow do something that could help the city. For the past several years I have been passionate about brewing and experimenting with harvesting wild yeast and making interesting beers. I love sharing my beers with friends and family. I love talking about beer and brewing and to be able to make a living while sharing my passion is really a dream come true.

Police Department

When It Gets Cold You want to H.E.A.R. about this program...

Started in 2014, the H.E.A.R. program is the Health Emergency Assistance Registry. It provides assistance to at-risk residents, who are registered in the program, during times of weather emergencies (including extreme temperatures, hot or cold, and storms.) The service is free to qualifying Raytown residents, which could include the disabled, elderly and frail, or those relying on a health device powered by electricity.

During times of weather emergencies, including extreme temperatures and storms, the Raytown Police will activate the program. Department members will try to make contact with those registered in the program, either by phone or at their residence, to check their welfare and offer any assistance. Anyone wishing to enroll in the H.E.A.R. Program must first complete an application. Applications may be obtained in person at Police Headquarters, by phone request at 816-737-6124, or online at photos.raytownpolice.org/H.E.A.R.%20Brochure.pdf.

Ways to Get Involved with the Police Department:

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) – The CERT Program teaches volunteer citizens disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact the area in which they live. The training includes basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. With the training learned in the classroom, and during exercises, CERT members may be better prepared to assist others in their neighborhood or workplace when professional responders are not immediately available to help after an event.

Citizens Police Academy – this gives individuals a chance to learn why, what and how things are done in the police department.

Postal Carrier Alert Program – Carrier Alert can offer the peace of mind that someone who visits your home regularly, your letter carrier, will call for help if appears you need it

Ride-Along Program – The Police Department Ride-Along Program is one of the public programs offered by the Raytown Police Department. This program enables the general public to observe first-hand what officers encounter during a normal tour of duty.

Emergency Medical Services

Raytown EMS is the exclusive provider of non-emergency and emergency ambulance service for the City of Raytown. Operating two 24-hour-a-day ambulances, Raytown EMS employs 9 paramedics and 5 EMTs full time. Raytown EMS is an accredited training center through the State of Missouri's Bureau of Emergency Medical Services.

One way the department serves the community is through our Car Seat Inspections. The department has 14 certified technicians that can install and check child passenger seats for anyone. You can stop by the EMS building between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Their website also shows the latest in recalls. They also have an event planned in September be watching for details.

WAYS TO GET INVOLVED WITH EMS:

Participate in our Blood Drives – The department periodically holds Blood Drives in conjunction with the Community Blood Bank.

Emergency Medical Technician Academy – Raytown Emergency Medical Services Training Academy will provide participants with the knowledge to become professional pre-hospital care providers. The participants will undergo a comprehensive program built around high standards and quality instructors. Clinical experiences will meet and exceed the minimum requirements giving students a well rounded and complete hands on experience translating into professional and career success.

Learn CPR – The Raytown Emergency Medical Services offers Friends and Family CPR to the community for a minimal fee. This class was created by the American Heart Association for those people of all ages who want to learn CPR but do not need a course completion card in CPR.
